



Modern World's First The Atlatl contest held in Saratoga. Wyoming in 1981 has expanded to many states in the U.S., to Canada and to at least one European This is great. It is country. gratifying that the majority of the contests require the equipment to be made out of materials available to spear-thrower prehistoric hunters of the world.

Back in the early 1980's, there was confusion on how to pronounce ATLATL. Dr. Jane Day of the Denver History ofNatural Museum researched the Central American name for the spear-thrower. Atlatl is an Aztecan word and pronounced Aht-lahtl. We settled for at-latl and insisted and persisted for years at the "birthplace" of Atlatl Contests that that was the correct

pronunciation.

Another bit of gratification is that the majority of Atlati contests follow the big game scene with the targets, painted cardboard animals and the short course as rugged as the available terrain can make it.

And now, we are going to have an actual atlati big game hunt!!! Thanks to the vision and planning of Buckhorn Creek Steve coleman. Ranch, Vedalia, Georgia. Steve has a working bison and wild boar ranch and March 15-16, 1992 will have the "first atl-atl wild Boar hunt" since the stone age. In keeping with this prehistoric big game hunting weapon, he requires the atlatis and spears entering the hunt to be made of natural materials.

We in Saratoga, the modern Worlds Atlatl contest "birthplace," are pleased that natural materials are required. But



FLORIDA EXPERTS SPREAD SEARCH FOR ANCIENT AMERICAN SHORELINE

About 11,000 years ago, when the first Floridians walked the state, they had much more real estate to roam. Sea level was lower and portions of the Gulf of Mexico's coastline extended 100 miles beyond the modern shore.

Scientists are looking beneath the waves off Florida's Gulf Coast for that ancient shoreline. Archaeologists hope to find evidence of the Clovis people, believed to have been the first inhabitants of North America.

"Clearly they were here and they were here when the water levels were depressed," said James S. Dunbar, Field Supervisor for the Florida Bureau of Archaeological Research in Tallahassee.

The search for the Clovis shoreline, could help guide the larger scientific debate over when and how the Americas were first settled.

Little is known about the lives of the Mammoth-hunting "What did their Clovis. environment look like? What artifacts kind of did people have, and what were they doing there?" Dunbar asked. He is studying submerged sites in the Aucilla River and off the shore of Apalachee Bay, both near Tallahassee, for evidence of the Clovis people and other prehistoric Indians.

Nearly 60 Clovis artifacts, many of them fluted stone points, have been discovered in Florida. All were found either on land or on the bottom of inland rivers and freshwater springs, which would

have attracted people.

At sites three to 6 miles offshore of the Aucilla River, scientists have found stone artifacts from prehistoric Indians who lived about 7,000 years ago.

Although those Indians lived after the Clovis people, hope to find researchers the earliest evidence of Indian's as they press farther offshore, said Michael Faught, doctoral candidate at the University of Arizona, who is studying early Indian sites off Florida's coast.

Federal researchers studying a former sinkhole 21 miles offshore, and have found undatable stone artifacts, plus a piece of live oak which was found to be 8,200 years old. This means that the sinkhole was surrounded by dry land The pond probably then. attracted large animals, which in turn attracted prehistoric Indians.

A search for prehistoric relics is expected to continue next year at that sinkhole, and researchers are seeking spots, including additional rock outcroppings that were sources of the stone for the tools. Marine archaeologist, Rik Anuskiewicz said, "These sites are out there. It's just a question of when and how many more we're going to find."

The search for the Clovis shoreline in Florida feeds into of the most important debates in archaeology: When did people first come to the Americas, and how did they get here? The most widely accepted explanation is that thev from Siberia into crossed Alaska.

Buffalo, NY -- Scientists have found human blood-possibly 11,000 years old--on a stone knife blade discovered at a site in Washington state used by some of the continent's first inhabitants, an archaeologist said.

"This is the blood of the Clovis," Buffalo archaeologist R. Michael Gramley said, referring to the culture believed to have populated North America just after the last Ice Age. "THE DENVER POST."





inch) length a decorative map has been carved which represents some 150 miles of the Gibson Desert in Australia.




DICKSON MOUNDS -- LEWISTOWN, IL

Leni Clubb sent in this rock art drawing from a poster for Kakadu National Park, Northern Territory, Australia:



The figures are explained as follows:

The running man holds a wooden bladed spear in a spearthrower and in the other hand a bundle of short bamboo "goose spears" tipped with a sliver of hardwood.

He is portrayed wearing three dilly bags, one on his head, another from his neck and the third from his hair belt. Pandanus leaf ornaments are suspended from his arms.

There are spirit figures to his left, and human female figures, one carrying a dilly bag in her hand is on his right. A post-contact figure of a European with an upraised arm, "the preacherman", is on the lower left of the painting.
