

Another Early Date for Spearthrower Use in Brazil




Figure 1. Number 1 and 2 are spearthrowers, and number 3 is a club. (Diagram is courtesy of the Museu Paraense Emilio Goeldi, Brazil)

In 1994, five wooden implements, recovered from the archaeological site Piririma-PA-IT (2108) in the region of Rio Tapajos, Brazil were identified as spearthrowers. This site is located four to five meters beneath the surface of a former stream bed. The spearthrowers were found in the middle of the stratified layers of the excavation. The five spearthrowers (see Figure 1, numbers 1 and 2, for examples) were made from a material called "holy wood" or "iron wood" (caesalpiniaceae). The significance of these

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spearthrowers is that a wood sample taken from one of the implements was radiocarbon dated to approximately 4,350 ± 150 years before present at the Geochronological Laboratory of Cambridge University. This makes these tools among the oldest found in Brazil in an archaeological context. This is also one of the oldest dates for preserved wooden material used by early people in that country. It cannot be said for certain whether these spearthrowers are the oldest in Brazil or South America, as more discoveries are still being made in the Tapajos region of Brazil. No hooks were recovered with the spearthrowers, but stone lithics and ceramics were found at the site.

NEWS FROM OHIO

Forty members of the newly formed Ohio Atlatl Association held their first open atlatl competition as part of the annual Knap-in conducted by the Flint Ridge Lithic Society.

There has been an atlatl contest as part of the Flint Ridge Lithic Society Knap-in every year for as long as anyone can remember. This year, however, when I called to ask if the WAA International Standard Accuracy Competition could be part of the atlatl contest, FRLS leaders Carl Fry, Roy Miller, Jim Fultz and Dan Minard all said, "Well Ray, why don't you go ahead and organize the competition this year?" Obviously these lithic leaders learned how to delegate authority a long time ago.

As part of the overall event, three separate atlatl contests were offered: The Ohio Standard Accuracy Competition, WAA International Standard Accuracy Competition, and the Thirty Second Montezuma Maalox Moment.

The first involved contestants casting three darts from each of four distances, 15, 20, 25, and 30 meters, using the WAA International Standard Accuracy target. Although the field was divided into four groups, Men age 16 and over, Women age 16 and over, Teens 13 through 15, and Children under 13, the single person falling into the Teen division opted to compete with the adult men.

In the second competition, the WAA International Standard Accuracy scores topped out with Ray Strischek, 74; Daniel Sappington, 46; and Ron Mertz, with 42.

In the 30-Second Montezuma Maalox Moment, contestants had 30 seconds to cast as many darts at as many targets as they could. The 13 contestants spread out five feet apart casting at any of the 10 targets set 15 meters distant. In this competition, scoring is highly subjective, even difficult to calculate, in that the number of darts cast, the targets hit, and the points scored are all factored in together.

Results:

1st Aaron Mcavoy, 6 darts, 2 targets, 17 points.
2nd Bob Berg, 6 darts, 5 targets, 10 points.
3rd John Whittaker, 6 darts, 2 targets, 14

points.

(Note that the winner, Aaron Mcavoy was the 15 year old who chose to tough it out with the adult men. This was only the <u>second</u> time he had used an atlatl.)

It is important to remember that in warfare, wounding an enemy means that one or two other warriors are usually needed to help drag their wounded buddy off the field, thus reducing the enemy's force by as many as three. The dead are just left where they drop. This is why the scoring of such a contest is so...um...subjective.

A special award was given to U. E. "Whitie" Whiteis, of Columbus, OH for his beautiful hand-crafted atlatl. It boasted a whale board style handle, a dog tooth inserted in the nose of a human face carved in the round, with pearly white teeth, ruby red lips, and sparkling rock eyes. The spur end was topped-off with a full feather headdress with plaid headband. "Whitie" is 76 years old, and competed throughout the hot

August day without complaint, wearing bib overalls, a blue long sleeve flannel shirt, high-top steel toe boots, and a baseball cap. The rest of us were all betting he had wool long johns under that outfit, but were too intimidated by his high level of energy to ask.

The weather was great—the only four straight days of warm, dry, bug-free days Ohio has had all year. Everyone reported having a great time, and we got our Ohio Atlatl Association off the ground and running. We are 40 strong and growing. Our purpose is to work in harmony (not in competition) with the World Atlatl Association, the Michigan Atlatl Association, those atlatl associations currently being formed by Ray Madden in Missouri, Bob Berg in New York, and Chuck Butorajac in Pennsylvania, and any other groups we haven't heard of yet. Our goal is to spread the word about the atlatl as an important step in the evolution of human existence worldwide, and the pure joy and sense of self accomplishment that come from casting a dart with the atlatl, day in and day out.

Dues are \$5.00 per year, payable as an entry fee at the next competition. If you want to be a member of the Ohio Atlatl Association, but cannot attend the next competition, just send your name and address to the OAA, and dues will be waived. 

Sep. 21, 1996. The first Pennsylvania State Atlatl Championships had six really good throwers: Russell Richard from Wyoming, Rich Rocchio from New York, Ray Strischek from Ohio, and Paul Gleckl, Gary Fogelman, and Chuck Butorajac from Pennsylvania.

The competition consisted of three throws each from eight different positions at a three-dimensional deer target. Throwing distances varied

from 8 to 40 yards through the woods simulating normal hunting conditions. The results were:

3rd Russell Richard 66 points
(Ray beat Russell out after a 14 throw tie breaker)

A fun shot at a moving target proved to be a big hit. - get it- BIG HIT!! (Sorry about that.)

After throwing a 94 a few days earlier in practice for the WAA International Standard Accuracy Contest, I managed only a very humbling and frustrating 5th place 41 score in the actual accuracy contest. Results of the six throwers were:

Superlatives are the only words that can be used to describe the atlatl contest on Sept. 28th on Bois Blanc Island in Lake Huron. The island is absolutely beautiful! Deep woods, trees starting to turn fall colors, sandy beaches where other activities took place, and where the people camped... What a fantastic place to hold an atlatl contest!!!

The target areas all began from a "two-track" dirt road into the woods. One throw was 105 meters down a power line path with trees overhanging the path, partially hiding the target. The cardboard targets with deer in rarious attitudes against a painted tangled forest background made them difficult to see from a distance, adding to the illusion of a real hunt.

It was not a course for the faint of heart, as a lot of walking and careful consideration of how to throw were involved. For many of us, it was the first time we had competed in a deep woods. Eight members of the WAA Executive Board came from California and Colorado to conduct the contest and we all agreed that it was a great event. Our special thanks

Ray Strischek was quick to show his championship style by donating a reproduction of an atlatl to the collection. As luck would have it, the atlatl spur fit perfectly onto an original dart displayed on the wall. Both are now exhibited together.

The day ended with a homemade chili dinner supplied by Mrs. Lynn Helmick.

We'll keep our fingers crossed for better weather next year when the 6th Annual West Virginia State Atlatl Championship will once again be held on the Davis & Elkins College campus. Competition will begin at 1:15 p.m. on September 27, 1997.



Having spent over two years in research to update the atlatt to the 21st century, I have developed a new full contact power handle achieving speeds in excess of 125 mph, says atlatt manufacturer, Chuck Butorajac. Distances of over 150 yards are "no problem," and control with absolute consistency is assured. Pictured below, the power handle is made of ground walnut shells and glue to fit your particular




hand pattern. To order, you must submit an accurate outline of your throwing hand. The atlatl's main shaft uses straight-grained white oak, ash, hard maple or hickory, hand-shaved to 3/16 inch thick. The shaft is backed using deer sinew and hide glue. The spur is made of carved antler, anchored at just the proper angle to match the launch point of the spear. The price, \$195.00.

Other atlatls available include an adjustable length atlatl suitable for specific distance throws for \$145.00. The overall length is adjustable in one inch increments from 16 to 24 inches. The "shotgun" atlatl throws 8 unfletched spears at one time. This one is also sinew-backed and contains some plastic. The price is \$135.00. For \$110.00 a more traditional sinew-backed, wooden atlatl is available. Above prices include shipping and handling. (PA residents add 6% sales tax.)

Wing and Talon atlatl system consists of a 25-inch. non-weighted, oak atlatl matched to a take-down 60inch (approximate length when assembled) aluminum shaft dart. A steel "hook" on the atlatl mates with a standard arrow nock on the dart. The dart consists of two aluminum shafts that thread together with a specially designed fitting housed inside one shaft. The dart is fletched and includes a 145 grain target point.








SpearChucker with standard darts.



I have commissioned the nationally famous sculptor, Buck McCain to do a bronze of a mammoth kill. Measuring approximately 2 feet by 1 ½ feet by 1 3/4 feet in size, it will depict a mammoth surrounded by hunters with atlatls. Final details of the sculpture have not yet been determined as this is still in the planning stage.

The price starts at no less than \$2500 and progresses upwards as the casting continues. If you are

interested, the sooner you let me know, the better. I will start a list and will keep you posted through the newsletter or personally, if I hear from you.

To assist in the project, I need pictures of mammoths in any situation. I need pictures of primitive hunters and early atlatls—anything that would help compose this bronze.

Buck McCain is a great artist, who has been commissioned to do monumental bronzes across the country. He also does breathtaking oil paintings, primarily of archaic and primitive situations. In the aboriginal community of Aurukun on Cape York peninsula of Australia, they still practice some of the "old ways." This oldest surviving aboriginal culture rubs uneasily against modern society. However, the woomera is still used to perform what is called the "smell-of-the-country" ceremony. In the June, National Geographic, John Fraser tells of an experience in which he was told, "When you come to our country, you must ask for permission from an elder and be welcomed." The elder, Arthur Pambegan, brought in a woomera, and passing it under his arms, touched John on the shoulders and head while intoning a chant in Wik Mungkan, their traditional language. "That way, you will be safe and will sleep well."
