-@L@LALDER ACRES ATLATL TOURNAMENT -- July 19, 1997 By Rodger Klindt

The first annual Alder Acres Atlatl Tournament, held on the beautiful Tug Hill Plateau at the eastern end of Lake Ontario, proved to be a challenging event in more than one way. Let me tell you about Tug Hill. There are three seasons here; snow season (up to 400 inches a year), Black Fly season (just after snow), and Deer Fly season (Just before snow). In the 12 hours prior to the tournament, the season changed from Deer Fly to Snow with great rapidity. OK, maybe not snow, but 50 degree F (10 C) is a cold day in July. Just ask the guys from Pennsylvania who tended the bonfire all day to stave off frostbite.

Adverse weather aside, the tournament attracted 29 participants. A 10 station field course wound its way through woodlot, swamp, and fields. Targets consisted of five 3-D deer targets and five cardboard/haybale targets. Distances ranged from 5 to 27 meters. In addition to the field course, a life-size wooly mammoth was erected to round out the competition. Shooting distances at the mammoth varied for juniors, women, and men.

RABBITSTICK 1997 by Jim Ray

In early September, I received an invitation to attend the 10th annual Rabbitstick Primitive Skills Gathering, September 14th through 20th as the personal guest of BPS Engineering. Having never attended Rabbitstick, I decided to load up my tipi and poles onto the old blue pony (Ford pickup), and head for Rexburg, Idaho.

The name Rabbitstick is taken from a hand thrown primitive weapon used to kill rabbits and other small game. It looks a lot like a boomerang, but doesn't have the return capability.

The site of the gathering covers 400 acres of large and small grassy meadows surrounded by groves of trees and is bordered by Henry's Fork River. Many modern and primitive shelters were set up along with the tipis that seemed to fit the site so perfectly.

In keeping with the theme, most of the instructors and many of the students were dressed in primitive clothing, myself included. The rabbitstick is sponsored by the Boulder Outdoor Survival School, (BOSS) and directed by Dave and Paula Wescott, members of WAA. Instructors are chosen from the most knowledgeable and highly qualified people in the field of primitive technology. If you are at all interested in primitive skills and want to learn more about them, you can find just about everything at Rabbitstick. To my knowledge, it is the largest and oldest primitive skills gathering in the United States. There would not be nearly enough space in this article to list all of the classes and open forums available there.

On Saturday, Rabbitstick was open to the general public and a local atlatl contest was held. The awards presented to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners of three divisions were unique stone medallions etched with copies of authentic petroglyph images, provided by Bob Perkins. A WAA Grand Champion Plaque was presented to the overall winner. Following the local atlatl competition, an International Standard Accuracy competition was held for anyone wishing to enter. All scoring was done by WAA member Albert Abril. Following the ISAC, a bow and arrow competition was held.

The standard WAA competition was held on July 26th in Douglas, Wyoming with a good mix of beginners and experienced attatlists in three categories: men, women, and youth. Great support by the sponsors of the event made for a very enjoyable and educational weekend. Dianne O'Meagher, Arlene Earnst and Dave Noble organized and ran the two-day teaching rendezvous. 

While no records were broken among the men on the ISAC, Courtney Birkett of Grinnell College in Iowa set a USA women's record with a 66-X, and Christopher Mertz (8 years old) threw a 40, the highest ever for his age group in the United States.



Christopher Mertz, 8, scores 40 in ISAC






The Michigan Atlatl Season Wrap-up







WAA Place street sign, on Maui, Hawaii. From Charley Lilly.
