World Atlatl Association turns Twenty-five!

Wisconsin Hosts World Atlatl Association Twenty-fifth Annual Meeting

The annual meeting was held at the Izaak Walton League A.D. Sutherland Chapter land just east of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. There were thirty plus participants during the three days of fun filled activities. The weather for our event was quite hot, with some people leaving the event earlier than planned or not showing at all. We had pleasant light winds for most of the event and no rain.

We had set up a variety of targets for the event. We had our 3-D Hunters Round up in the woods, which consisted of various hunting scenarios ranging from brown bear, black bear, two deer, two turkeys, coyote, wolverine, Javelina, and a mosquito. This totaled thirty throws.

Another area was of our 2-D small game targets. These included, a duck, a squirrel, a rabbit, a goose, and a toad, which consisted ten throws.

We also held our Buck/Doe competition in the woods. This consisted of ten throws at either a buck or a doe deer. If the wrong target was hit it meant minus points. These combined targets and scored our Hunters Round.

The European Round, which was setup in the field, included three throws at each target. We set up the European round with animal targets that were drawn on cardboard with the corresponding circles on each.

The European Round Targets:

The 8-meter target was a Saber Tooth.

The 10-meter target was a Mosquito.

The 12-meter target was a Bison.

The 14-meter target was a Woolly Mammoth.

The 16-meter was an Elk.

The 18-meter target was a Moose.

The 20-meter target was a T-Rex.

The 22-meter target was a Rhino.

The 24-meter target was a Brown Bear.

The 24-meter target was a Frog.







A separate shaded ISAC range, with one practice/warm-up ISAC target was set up. We also had a shared Demo and US Open Range. This totaled one hundred throws not including practice.




In case that wasn't enough throws, during the evening, before dusk, we had several options for fun targets. The favorite was the four-foot diameter dartboard, drawn on cardboard for playing Cricket or 301. This works well with the use of a battery operated dartboard to help with keeping score. Our running pig saw some action too and the Mini Mammoth Tic Tack Toe never made it out of storage, due to the continued 301 games.

Each morning started with our "Opening Ceremony" of Slice The Cheese. A cheese head was placed on a pole inside a larger hoop made out of swimming noodles. These were laid out on the ground at about thirty yards. Participants threw their darts to either place them inside the circle for a single piece of string cheese or try for the cheese head, which would reward them with a block of one of the various varieties of cheeses to choose from. We had three people "slice" the cheese. They were Doug Miller from Wisconsin, formally Illinois, Dave Sheppard from Wyoming, and Andy Majorski from Pennsylvania. Many people where able to get their dart into the circle for a piece of Baker's string cheese.



Starting from the left, the first atlati is an Midwestern/South- eastern Archaic style atlati with a knobbed crescent bannerstone, deer antier hook, and antier handle. The second is another Archaic style atlati with a double notched winged bannerstone, deer antier hook, and antier handle. The third atlati is an Australian style atlati made by Ray Madden. I believe he said it was a Southeastern style. The fourth is another Archaic style atlati with a horned bannerstone with deer antier hook, and bone handle. The fifth is reproduction of an Eskimo style atlati that is in the Smithsonian Institute. The sixth is a reproduction of a short style atlati found in Santa Barbara, CA. The seventh is a reproduction Both Ray Handle style atlati found in Santa Barbara, CA. The seventh is a reproduction Both Ray Handle style atlati with a composite weight and deer antier hook. The ninth is a reproduction Aztec style atlati.

Hoosier Outdoor Experience includes Atlatls

The Hoosier Outdoor Experience is Indiana's largest, hands-on outdoor recreation event. Coordinated by the Indiana Department of Natural Resources it was held on the grounds of Fort Harrison State Park on September 15 and 16, 2012. An event for "doing, not watching". There were just over 50 different activities in which to participate and throwing a dart with an atlatl was one of them!

The sponsor of the atlatl demos was the Indiana State Museum. David McDaniel, Director of Outreach, Stevie Butler, a Museum Interpreter, and Jane Ann Buchanan, a volunteer extraordinaire set up the targets and spent 2 full days teaching Hoosiers of all ages what an atlatl was and how to use one to throw a dart. Frank and I were lucky enough to be able to assist them for parts of both days.



Jane Ann Buchanan, the museum volunteer who spent hours this weekend teaching folks how to throw. She is in her early 80's and outworked us all.

Interest was high and the line never fell below 10 and often had 20-25 participants. Fortunately, the weather was perfect—no wind and temperatures in the 70s. For the younger folks, between 5 and 10, we used a slightly smaller atlatl and the type that allows the dart to balance in a rest so the thrower does not have to coordinate holding and releasing the dart. The adults had more of a challenge using the type of atlatl with loops on each side of the handle. There were some amazing first throws by some of our teenagers.

Some of the other hands-on activities at the Hoosier Outdoor Experience included canoeing, kayaking, wall climbing, wood carving, basic fishing, fly-tying, historic trivia, water dog demos, tree dog demos, caving, gold panning, golf, tennis, back-country hiking essentials—just to name a few. In addition, you could visit the Museum of 20th Century Warfare in the park, learn turkey hunting safety, visit the NRA display, learn archery, learn how to fire a pellet rifle and a shotgun, as well as learn how to take waterfowl, deer, and fish from field to table. And, there was much more. Something for everyone.

Currently the Indiana State Museum is sponsoring a "Buy-a-Bone" program to help restore "Fred". Fred is the name given to bull mastodon remains found in the muck soil of an ancient lake just west of Fort Wayne, IN on land owned by Dan Buesching. According to the museum website, scientific sectioning of one tusk revealed Fred to have been 33 years old and a radiocarbon date showed the skeleton to be 11, 280 years old. The Buy-a-Bone program is an effort to raise enough money to undertake a realbone mount of Fred He will become the centerpiece of an exhibition titled Monsters of the Muck: Indiana's Elephant Graveyards. By the way, bones start at \$50 a piece, and in return you get a certificate of "Bone Ownership", and a special presentation box to display the certificate and a fragment of mastodon tusk or bone. Quest for the ISAC Crowns as of Early September

To date, 472 people (323 men, 98 women and 51 youth) have made 1,656 entries at 104 venues around the world. About a third of each division has "Made the Board" – men 30% (98/323); women 30% (29/98); youth 33% (17/51). The top 10 in each division (6% of all the competitors) account for 24% of those entries, so let's see how they are doing.

The top 10 youth have made 73 entries and 59% of their scores are 55 or above. Five youth have made a better percent of success, in fact, three (Antoine, Fanny and Hunter) have all made 100%. **Antoine Jamon**, top score **95-2X** (**new world record**), is the only youth in history to shoot four 90s in the same year and has made **100%** (5 out of 5 entries);

Report from Cahokia, 2012

The Annual World Atlatl Association event at the Cahokia Mounds World Heritage site was a blast as always, even if it did get off to a rainy start. The last ISAC of the day on Friday the 7th was cut short after only 4 rounds, when a sudden downpour soaked everyone and everything. As dry as it's been this summer we

needed the rain, but the timing made it a bit hard to be as pleased as we should have been. Fortunately the rain cleared up by morning, and everyone reassembled to throw a full day of games-The event included ISACs, a full European, a 40cm archery target throw (Thrown at a 40cm FITA archery face from 8 and 10 meters), a World Atlatl Day style throw, and a "Hunter's challenge" thrown at several different distances using a 2-d buck target with an outlined kill zone. In the Hunter's Challenge, only hits to the kill zone counted toward the score. Awards were given for the European, and scores from all the games were combined to figure a Grand Championship. 28 competitors from 7 states participated in the event, and some came from as far away as Pennsylvania.

After a pizza dinner on Saturday evening, and a video on the historic aspects of the site introduced by William Iseminger, assistant manager of the center, there was an award ceremony in the museum auditorium. Prizes were generously donated by Linda Krieg of the museum gift shop, and those receiving awards from the European contest were allowed to pick what appealed to them from the donated items. Prizes were thematic to the site, including such items as a Cahokia Historic Site t-shirt, books

and comic books, and even a replica Mississippian pipe. Additionally, Jon Wood won a throw-off for Grand Champion, and was awarded a plaque. After the awards were handed out, Dr. John Whittaker gave an informative talk on his recent and ongoing research into atlatl and dart function, as well as their broader place in experimental archaeology. Overall it was a great time at a great location, and we hope you can make it out to join us next year!

The 2012 Oxford event was our best ever. Oxford

Rod & Gun Club president Alan Youngs, archery director Jim Vangieson and his son Scott went out their way to make sure we had everything we needed. The whole facility was well maintained. They had the second to none anywhere 40 target 3D course set up even better than last year and mowed the grass on the ISAC ranges like a golf course.

Always popular at this event is open field long range shooting at 3D targets in an unstructured format. No score cards, but shots fired during these informal "follow the leader" shoots are

remembered for years. This year was no exception. Club archery director Jim Vangieson brought me full sized 3D targets of elk, two

feeding deer, a standing black bear, and a coyote which I set up in as life like a scene as possible in the main field where we had shooting opportunities from distances up to over a

hundred yards. This area is visible from the clubhouses and the road. Everyone at the place pauses to watch us shoot these targets at long range. Participants and spectators all roar approval at our long range hits. 60-70 yd. "kills" on the elk are common shooting from the ISAC ranges.

This year there was a traditional archery tournament held on Sunday that shot on the 40 target 3D course. They shot from the orange pin, atlatlists from the red pin. Yardages varied but in general the orange pins were about one third farther away than the red pins. Red pin atlatl range was about 8-16yrds. Scoring on this range gives an extra point for an "X" and X rings averaged about the size of a silver dollar. Atlatlists kept score cards so that real data could be gathered to compare atlatls to traditional

archery equipment. This data can be used in discussions involving real, ethical hunting ranges and for legalization justification. Not to mention

> bragging rights! Those archers sure knew we were there! Out of a possible score of 440, 40x the atlatlists had a high score from Ken Faucher of 269xxxx! And the atlatls averaged 207! Only the very best archers could beat us! One club regular archer that I talked with came from the woods smiling over his good round reported a 262. I don't have all the data yet but Doug & Marlin Bassett shot with archery equipment and Doug shot well into the 300's and to the best of my knowledge Marlin won the youth division. Fatigue was a real factor on this demanding course shooting forty targets on a mile and a half woods trail with hills. More on this

later when I get all the data.

Oxford wouldn't be Oxford without the Charging Boar target. This target is powered by a heavy 75' long bungee cord accelerates and decelerates, and goes really fast. It simulates one of the best hunting shots for atlatls, close range moving targets. Shooters and spectators are amazed by how effective our ancient hunting implement is. Big game in motion have already made their decision where they are going and are far less likely to be able to dodge, duck, or jump a dart or pick up flagging motion my experience has shown.

Next year we have our own event. This will be July 4 weekend and is tentatively scheduled for July 5-8 2013. This we hope to make this into THE midsummer event. We will invite the archers

as all the "regulars" missed shooting with them and the few we talked to also missed shooting with us.

Again thank you to all that attended and made the event happen.


