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Atlatl: Old-School Multitool

A very good definition of a multitool is given by wikipedia, and I will repeat it here: "any one of a range of portable, versatile hand tools that combines several individual functions in a single unit". As a light weight hiker, I often try to think of ways to lighten and simplify my tool kit. Coming up with more ways to use a single object is a good way to accomplish this, for instance, lightweight backpackers will often use "Poncho tarps", which are dual use items that function both as rain gear and shelter. As a sic-fi buff, I often find myself thinking of the Moties, the aliens of the novel "*The Mote in God's Eye*", by Larry Niven and Jerry Pournell-a species who have utilized their planet's raw resources to the point that every component of their spacecraft must serve many duties, making their technology complex and unintelligible to human engineers. What do hiking and sci-fi have to do with atlatls?

It's impossible to really put yourself in the place of a member of another culture, especially one which has become extinct or otherwise changed dramatically by time. I often try to imagine life as a Basketmaker II person. These are the North American atlatl wielding archeological culture about whom we know the most, although that knowledge is admittedly scant. We do know a few things about them, though. They were farmers, and they were hunters, and were likely very typical of late archaic people across this continent. Their sandals are sturdy and often heavily worn, and their hunting grounds, marked by petroglyphs and campsites, are often very far from reliable water sources. This tells us that they were very mobile-one could imagine them as the lightweight backpackers of their day. Every ounce of material they carried with them could be a liability later, as they had to work harder to carry it, and move slower because of it. They, like later peoples of the same area (Geib and Robins, 2008), would likely cache gear, water and food afield, though much would still need to be carried. These people would have likely been very interested in developing multiple use equipment, or multitools.

Many of us are familiar with the dual-and multi uses of the atlatls of the Australians. These have been documented as finding secondary uses including but not limited to fire hearths, adzes, dinner plates, water bowls, shields, knives, digging sticks, etc. But this multi-use phenomenon is not unique to the Australians. The handles of at least two archaeologic atlatls from North America have seen use as pressure flakers for flintknapping. These are the Cowbone Cave atlatl, described as the "Lake Winnemucca 2-purpose atlatl" and bearing an antler tine pressure flaker for a handle (Mildner, 1974), and the Plush Cave atlatl, which bears use wear at the wooden handle tip suggesting it's function in knapping (Spencer et al, 1994).

Additionally, several examples of Great Basin and Basketmaker atlatls feature bundles of cordage above their fingerloops. These have been in some cases interpreted as decoration or fetishes (Hunter, 1992), however from a utilitarian standpoint, they certainly serve the function of spool for carrying cordage (LaRue, 2010). Even those examples which are likely decorative (Cowbone Cave and Sand Dune Cave, for example) could be taken apart in a pinch, very similar to the modern "Survival bracelet" of paracord-These are worn as an ornament, but are designed such that in an emergency they can be deconstructed for their useful components. It's helpful to note that some of these atlatls utilize far more cordage than is needed to augment the attachment of their finger loops-for example, the "Grand Gulch" atlatl from the Hazzard collection (Item #29-43-49 at the Univeristy of Pennsylvania museum of Archeology and Anthropology) and the McEuen Cave atlatl. These utilize very substantial masses of cordage. Further, the McEuen Cave atlatl features a large mass of pitch on the handle, (Moreno, 2000) suggesting a possible use as a pitch stick for carrying glue as well.

Many of us in the atlatl throwing world are familiar with Bob Berg's work with eastern bannerstones as spindle whorls. It is Berg's opinion that bannerstones are not atlatl components, but rather components of spindles for producing cordage (Berg, 2004). Regardless of whether bannerstones were in fact atlatl parts or components of spindles,

the two need not be mutually exclusive. I have experimented with producing single and 2 ply yarn utilizing a typical unweighted Basketmaker II atlatl as a vertical spindle. In this usage, a leader is hitched to the atlatl just above the loops, the atlatl stood vertically, spur-end down, resting on the ground, and spun. The resulting cordage is wound around the area above the loops as it grows longer. After producing enough single ply cordage, it can be unrolled, doubled over and plied, using the atlatl as either a drop or vertical spindle. This use for an atlatl would have been directly and

intuitively obvious to any atlatl user who came from a culture which performed spinning by spindle, as any reasonably heavy stick can be used as a spindle. depending on how it is used, adding weights to the atlatl may increases it's efficiency as a spindle, however I would not suggest this as a primary function of atlatl weights.

How many secondary uses of atlatls and other archaeologically recovered articles are as unknown and confusing to us in our modern culture as the technology of the Aliens was to humans in the afore mentioned sic-fi novel? Across the immense span of time it's likely atlatls have been put to every use a reasonably straight, two-foot long stick can be used for, and may have incorporated design features to facilitate these uses-but how subtle are the traces of these uses, even when they do leave marks on the artifact (And even more so when they don't)? When looking at atlatls and other archaeologic artifacts, it's best to keep an open mind, but try to imagine the mindset of their creator. Although we'll never likely know what a person from another culture was really thinking in a given situation, we can at least gain some insight into what they might have been thinking-and besides, it's pretty nice to know that you don't need to carry a pressure flaker to sharpen your points when afield, and that you can spin and store cordage on your atlatl. Whether the ancients were really using these items for these purposes or not is of course unclear, but it all makes you think-and thinking is good.

Night hunt

Meadowcroft - Avella, PA

14-16 June 2013

Above the ancient rockshelter on the field of the Meadowcroft Museum people assembled from five states over the Father's Day weekend to compete with atlatls. Two throwing lanes were provided with round bales and room for thirty meter throws. The meadow fling was provided on the northern upslope with a 3-D Black Bear. Saturday's competition focused on three events as participants vied for the Miller Point Awards in the Men, Women and Youth Divisions. The three events were 1) Meadow Loft (Target with four progressively larger circles with fewer points 10, 8, 6 & 4 as circles got bigger; a small circle with a groundhog was placed in the center and was a negative 5 points - because if killed, the groundhog would not be available to lead people to the Rockshelter's discovery; best two of three throws were counted from 10, 15, 20, 25 & 30 meters; perfect score 100), 2) Hunter's Challenge (Deer target scoring 1-hit, 2-inner body, 3-lung, 4- spleen, 5-heart; one throw each from 20, 10, 30, 15 & 25 meters; perfect score 50) and 3) Meadow Fling (Five throws from 35 meters at the 3-D bear scoring 5-hit & 10-kill zone; perfect score 50. The Awards (engraved wooded plaque and pewter Miller Point replica) were presented to the winners by the director of the museum, Dave Scofield as noted below. The Saturday evening pot luck dinner was spearheaded by our gracious hosts, Margie and Frank Takoch who also set up all the ranges and tent shelters. The weather was mild and sunny with classical great weather on Saturday and we shot between showers on Sunday.

The **World Atlatl Day** sponsored by the **World Atlatl Association** was a big success in **Brockway PA** on Saturday, June 1st.

Much credit goes to Linda Brundage and New York Atlatl Association for having the foresight to develop this great program. The atlatl is a pre-historic hunting tool that projects a 7' dart. Today it has developed into a modern sport.

This event is challenging and its rules were established for two sets of distances, as determined by a throwers skill level. For throwers who have never thrown an ISAC score at least "70", the distance for two consecutive rounds of 5, 10, 10, 15, and 15 meters. For throwers who have thrown a score of "70" or higher each round would be 5, 10, 15, 20, and 25 meters.

Team size will remain three persons and any one person can be on more than one team. This provides the opportunity to throw many times per day.

The back of the envelope must be legibly signed by each person voting and have the word BALLOT written on it. Use one ballot for each eligible voter. Families voting may print additional ballots as needed and place all their ballots in the same envelope when mailing them.

To be eligible to vote, one must be a WAA member 18 years old or older with dues current on the date of the WAA Annual Meeting.
