

## **CARVED IN STONE**


I am a semi-retired carpenter/timber framer from central Missouri. I've been carving in wood in some way for over 50 years now and about 5 years ago I started carving in soft stone. I carved a small Nuthatch effigy pipe and was hooked immediately. While looking for more pipes online, I stumbled across some drilled bannerstones and had to try to make one. My first attempt was a Bowtie, or Wisconsin Winged out of some hard Soapstone. It turned out fairly well, so I started making different types of banners and pipes and my collection grew. While attending a knap-in in the Spring of 2011 at the Osage Knap-in near Boonville, MO, I noticed some people off in a field throwing darts and I thought I would show my banners to them. By the end of the day, I had joined the MAA. So, carving in stone got me involved with the Atlatl. *Note: all bored holes are roughly 1/2" diameter.*

**Steatite Bowtie 1a**



This is the very first Bannerstone I made. It was made from what I was told was Soapstone. I believe it's actually Serpentinite. It's as hard as Marble, if not harder. 3 1/2" wide X 2 1/2" tall X 7/8" thick. 2.8 oz.

Jerry is a new board member in the WAA. Expect a tutorial from him on making bannerstones in an upcoming newsletter.


The second Bannerstone for me. I think it's some Steatite/Serpentinite like the Wisconsin Winged. It is some pretty hard material. In the sunlight, you can see quite a bit of what appears to be Pyrite. One of the thinnest banners I've made to date. 3 3/4" wide X 3" tall X 15/16" thick. 2.6 oz.



Pipestone doesn't seem to have been a common material for banners, but I have seen a few made from it. This one is what some call a 'horned saddleback hourglass' banner. 2 3/4" long X 2" wide X 1" thick. 3.2 oz.



Another Pipestone Bannerstone. I believe this style is called a Butterfly. Nice lines and pretty easy to make. 3 1/2" wide X 2 1/2" tall X 1" thick. 2.9 oz.



When I first saw a Bottle Bannerstone, I wasn't impressed. I was focused on the Ovate banners at the time. I've since changed my mind. Except for the bored hole, there are no straight lines on these banners, just curves.

This Marble bottle is one of my favorites. Held up to a light, the edges are translucent. 3 1/4" long X 2 1/4" wide X 1" thick. 3.25 oz.




This Bottle Bannerstone made from some Soapstone (Steatite) from Wisconsin is medium hard material and takes a nice polish that accents the shape of this banner. Another keeper. This one will probably end up on an Atlatl one day. Although this one is almost identical in size and shape to the Marble banner above, it's quite a bit heavier.

3 1/4" long X 2 1/4" wide X 1" thick. 3.7 oz.






This Ovate Bannerstone was my first experience with Honeycomb Calcite. It was slightly nerve wracking for me because of all the cracks running through it. Pieces did break off while I was roughing it in, but once I got down to shaping, it was fine. I figure if it can withstand the boring process, it's solid. 3 5/8" wide X 3 1/8" tall X 1" thick. 2.6 oz.



The first Honeycomb Calcite Ovate turned out ok, so I decided to take a chance on an even more delicate type. Honeycomb Calcite is, to me, just a little softer to work than Marble. One of my all-time favorite banners. 3 1/8" wide X 3 3/4" tall X 1" thick. 3.6 oz

### **Platform Pipes**

There are, as far as I'm concerned, two styles of Hopewell platform pipes. The plain platform, which is just a stem and a stack. The stem can be flat or curved. Some are extremely curved and very thin. These pipes are also known as "Monitor" pipes.

The other style of platform pipe is an animal effigy pipe. Some of these pipes are incredibly detailed. From what I have seen, almost every animal that lived around the Hopewell people was represented by these pipes. I know I haven't seen every animal effigy pipe out there, but I don't believe I've seen one that didn't have a curved base, (platform) and the stem hole is almost always located so that the smoker was face to face with the animal entity.


I use the same soft sedimentary stone used by the ancient pipe carvers.

The plain platform pipe is relatively easy to make. The challenge to me is to make the stem thin and the stack round. Here are some of my favorites:

Nice stone, and easily worked. I'm not sure if I would fire this pipe up because of the different minerals or inclusions it's made of, especially in the stack. The lighter colored inclusions will transmit light. This stone is from the Kansas City area. 3 3/4" long X 1 5/8" tall X 1 1/8" wide.



The size and shape of this Minnesota Pipestone platform pipe is pretty typical for this style of Hopewell pipe. This is some high quality stone that is very consistent with no inclusions. 3 7/8" long X 1 1/2" tall X 1 1/4" wide.



This pipe is made of some Pipestone with a band of orange material running through it. Pretty common for some Pipestones. It has the same consistency as the red material. Quite a few of the platform pipes found have the stack placed in the center. 3 3/4" long X 1 5/8" tall X 1 1/8" wide.



The Steatite used for this curved base platform pipe is fairly hard stuff, falling somewhere between Pipestone and Marble. To me, it was well worth the extra effort it took to make this one. It took many hours of polishing by hand to get that finish. 4" long X 1 3/4" tall X 1 1/4" wide.



### Animal Effigy Pipes

When I make an effigy pipe, I will usually pick one that actually exists and try to replicate it as closely as I can. Over 140 smoking pipes have been recovered from the Tremper Mound alone. Add that to Mound City and the number of pipes belonging to museums, historical societies and private collections, there are many to choose from.

This is my first attempt at replicating a Great Blue Heron platform effigy pipe. I believe the original pipe was from the Mound City site in Ohio. The original eyes were probably made of copper or fresh water pearls. Mine are made of deer antler. Pipestone. 3 7/8" long X 2 1/4" tall X 1 1/8" wide.



Another Great Blue Heron pipe. This one is made from some Steatite from Wisconsin. Excellent stone and it takes a nice polish. Antler eyes. 3 7/8" long X 2 9/16" tall X 1 1/4" wide.


One of my favorite animal effigy pipes. This one is made from Minnesota Pipestone. You can see a thin layer of a different colored material running horizontally around the frog. Some call this a heartline. The eyes are made of some Pipestone cortex. 3 7/8" long X 2 1/8" tall X 1 1/4" wide.



Another frog effigy pipe. This one is made from some Wisconsin Steatite. Antler eyes. 3 7/8" long X 2 1/4" tall X 1 1/4" wide.



My favorite Pipestone Raven/Crow effigy pipe. As far as I can tell, bird effigies were either nesting (no legs) and standing with the legs and toes etched or carved in relief. Legs and toes in relief can be a challenge to make but are worth the trouble. Antler eyes. 4" long X 2 1/2" tall X 1 1/4" wide.



A Crow effigy pipe made from some Wisconsin Steatite. A very carveable rock. Antler eyes. 3 7/8" long X 2 3/8" tall X 1 1/8" wide.



## MISSOURI ATLATL DEER HARVEST FALL 2015

Two Missouri hunters, Paul Gragg and Eric Smith, harvested whitetails in Fall, 2015 with their atlatls. Paul, who had not used an atlatl until a few months before his successful hunt on October 24th, bagged a large 15-point buck. Eric, who bagged a doe on November 11th, has hunted with an atlatl since it was first made legal in Missouri in 2010. The following accounts were obtained through phone conversations, emails, and in Paul's case, from interviews by others posted on the web. Ron Mertz

### Paul Gragg's Record Buck

*I was first introduced to the atlatl during a demonstration by Brian and Dawn Wagner (WAA/MAA members) at the Missouri Deer Classic and Outdoor Expo in August. Although I had harvested a number of record bucks with a bow, I knew I had to take up this new challenge. After obtaining an atlatl and six hunting darts, I practiced almost every day and eventually was confident I could throw with reasonable accuracy at 10-15 yards.*

*I chose to hunt in St. Charles County along the edge of a creek near bottom land. I put my tree stand on a four-foot ledge near a path that deer often follow on their way to feed in an open field. About 3:30 in the afternoon he came off a ridge, crossed the creek, and jumped onto the ledge directly under my stand. Since I didn't want to throw straight down, I waited for him to walk about 8 yards from the tree and for him to put his head down so he wouldn't see me throw. I knew from years of experience that if you can see a deer's eyeballs, he will be able to see you.*

*Finally, when he dropped his head I threw. The dart hit right behind his left shoulder and he stumbled only a few yards before going down.*

*While I was concerned about penetration this was not a problem since the dart penetrated about eleven inches.*

*I never set out to harvest a record deer (Boone and Crockett score of 169 gross and 151 net) and only wanted to bag a buck. **I was in complete shock.***



## Eric Smith's Persistence Pays Off

*I got a doe with my atlatl and stone Clovis pointed dart Friday morning 11/20/15. It was firearms season, but I still used my atlatl since I had not been able to hunt with it during the first part of the archery season. I have been hunting every year since the atlatl and dart became legal for deer in 2010.*

*My river cane dart was hand made using stone tools and measured about 5 1/2 feet long with a oak fore shaft extending out another 3 1/2 inches. The point is 3 3/4" long by 1 1/4 wide and is styled like a Clovis point made from local Burlington Chert. It's ground on the sides and bottom.*

*The place I hunt in Jefferson County (just south of St. Louis) has an old abandoned but mowed grass landing strip running through it going into the woods. The deer use it heavily for traveling. It's only about 16 yards across and lined with large cedars so they come real close. I have a tall "U" shaped camo-cloth backed brush pile stand a couple feet back between two cedars. It is on the north side of the strip because the wind generally comes up from the south. I can see way up and down the runway through the cedars so I have plenty of time to get set to throw before they come by. However, I only have a small "window" to throw through when a deer is directly in front of me.*

*There are a few trees, then a house and yard behind me and a semi steep wooded hill on the other side. The strip acts like a funnel for deer movement, which they use heavily. The bucks rub and scrap all along the strip. I set the blind back about four feet from the edge of the strip between two large cedars. The wind mostly comes from the south/southwest so it blows my sent away from the strip towards the house. The grass strip is flat, but the ground where the stand is located is steeply slopped so I leveled the area inside the blind allowing a proper stance for my throw. Also, since I had once spooked a deer by the sound created when I very slightly moved my toe on the rocky floor, I covered the area with pine needles - no leaves or twigs (very quiet). I also have a wood stool to sit on while waiting.*



*A short distance from the beginning of the strip is a pond. The deer move in the morning from the pond area down the strip to bed down in the large tract of woods at the end. They move pretty constantly from about 7 am to 10 am. I can see through the cedars both directions about a hundred yards, giving me plenty of time to get ready.*



*The day I got my deer:*

*At 7:30 am I spotted a doe and two younger ones milling around the beginning of the strip about a hundred yards away. I stood up hoping they would choose the strip instead of a trail that goes into the woods. I started getting real excited when they began moving down the strip with the doe in the lead. I raised my dart and got set to throw. At first they were on the far side of the strip but as they drew closer the doe moved to the near side. She would take a few steps, then wait on the young ones, take a few more steps, then wait. Each time she moved I got more and more excited. I had to try to relax and control my breathing. She moved one more time and stopped just outside of my narrow throwing window. At that spot I was the most vulnerable since she could potentially hear, smell, or see me through the trees, but she was more interested in looking back at the others*

about 20 yards behind. I stood frozen for a couple minutes, which seemed like an hour, afraid I would slightly move or she would hear my heart pounding. She took a couple more steps and stopped perfectly in my window only 15 feet away. When she looked back again I threw. The dart stuck right where I wanted, she kicked up her hind feet when hit and turned and bounded twice with the dart bouncing up and down as she leaped before going over the far edge into the woods and out of sight. As I stood there in amazement I realized the other two deer were still there, so I picked up my other dart just in case. The closest one seemed confused and kept moving back and forth, but eventually they went back the way they came.

I sat down and waited about 20 minutes, replaying in my mind what had just happened. I then crept over to the edge to take a look. I was disappointed and worried when I saw no sign of her. I quickly picked up her dry trail down the hill. For the first 60 yards I saw no sign of blood then a small trail that got bigger. I spotted my dart laying by a small tree with the blade missing, and a couple yards further I saw the doe half covered in leaves up against a log. I sat on the log taking it in, enjoying the moment, and letting loose a couple of excited hollers.

While field dressing, I found the broken blade close to the heart in the first lung which had a lot of damage. It's possible that the dart hit the small tree and broke, but I believe she fell and flipped down hill covering herself with leaves and breaking the point in the process. I found the blade in the lung. There was a lot of damage to that lung, I presume from the dart flopping around as she ran.

The point broke inside the sinew hafting line at the fore shaft. I don't know of any applicable articles about breakage of points, but we're looking at the similarities of the broken ones at the Martins site (a paleo-hunting site).

**I can't wait till next year!!**

## The 2015 Champions

627 people (118 youth, 135 women and 364 men) made 2,339 entries in the ISAC in 2015. In the following list of top ten people in each division, each person is followed by their highlights of the year. The number in parentheses is their top-five aggregate (youth 40, women 50, men 70) for those who qualify. The “batting average” is the number of 90’s thrown divided by the games thrown for a total year or career.

### Youth

- 1 – 90-X Marlin Bassett - NY (88.06) **Personal record** and sixth time in the Top 10. Highest score ever thrown by a 12 year-old. Set new records for most career games (364) for any youth in ISAC history (only youth over 80 games) and in the top fifteen-game increment (82.73).
- 1 – 90-X Carter Ashley - TN (73.08) **Personal record** and **first time** in the Top 10 of three “Board Years”. Also tied the highest score ever thrown by a 12 year-old.
- 3 - 89 Fanny Jamon - France (79.86) **Personal record** and fifth time in the Top 10 of five “Board Years” and sixth highest score ever thrown by a 15-year old (highest female).
- 4 - 88 Chad Winkler - CO (86.10) Fourth time in the Top 10 of four “Board Years”. Eighth highest score ever thrown by a 15-year old.
- 5 - 83 Lucie Jamon - France (72.80) Fifth time in the Top 10 of six “Board Years” and sixteenth highest score ever thrown by a 15-year old.
- 6 - 82-X Will Klumpenhauer - CO (66.06) **Personal record** and second time in the Top 10 of three “Board Years” and tenth highest score ever thrown by a 14-year old.
- 7 - 81 Corentin Deppe - France (threw 2 games) **Personal record** and **first time** in the Top 10 of three “Board Years”.
- 8 - 78 Peter Oles - CO (74.62) **Personal record** and **first time** in the Top 10 of three “Board Years”.
- 9 - 72-X Caleb Gates IV – CO (63.62) **Personal record** and second time in the Top 10 of three “Board Years”.
- 10 - 71-2X Matthew Ciarapica - WV (only threw 1 game as a youth) **Personal record** and **first time** in the Top 10 of four “Board Years”.

### Women

- 1 - 82 Lori Majorsky - PA (78.64) Sixteenth time in the Top 10 of seventeen “Board Years”.
- 2 - 81-X JoAnne Fogelman - PA (69.02) **Seventeenth** time in the Top 10. One of only three women to score more than 20,000 career points.
- 3 - 81-X Debbie Andrews - OH (74.64) Seventh time in the Top 10 of twelve “Board Years”.
- 4 - 79 Ursula Räss - Switzerland (threw 4 games) Fifth time in the Top 10 of nine “Board Years”.
- 5 - 78 Maren Petersen - Germany (threw 2 games) Third time in the Top 10 of Nine “Board Years”.
- 6 - 76 Sue Mercer - NY (71.60) Fifth time in the Top 10 of nine “Board Years”.
- 7 - 76 Nisa Holbrook - WV (74.72) **Personal record** and **first time** in the Top 10 of four “Board Years”.
- 8 - 75 Dawn Wagner - MO (69.44) **Personal record** and **first time** in the Top 10 of two “Board Years”.
- 9 - 75 Mariah Sheppard - WY (64.22) **Personal record** and **first time** in the Top 10 of eight “Board Years”.
- 10 - 74 Margie Takoch - OH (65.20) Thirteenth time in the Top 10 of seventeen “Board Years”.

### Men

- 1 - 98-5X Douglas Bassett - NY (**97.66**) **Personal record** and **fifth** time as World Champion. Ninth year with a top-five average over 95. Most ISACs thrown (867). Only person with more than 130 games of 90 or better (427); only person with a career batting average over .375 (.493); only person over 45,000 career points (75,501.2); only person over 350 career X’s (862).

- 2 - 96-3X Bob Kitch - WA (89.94) **Personal record** and third time in the Top 10 of eleven “Board Years” and tenth highest scoring person of all time.
- 3 - 96-2X Ray Strischek - OH (93.32) Fifteenth time in the Top 10 of **Twenty** “Board Years” and still ranked #2 in the world in ISAC History.
- 4 - 96-2X Jon Wood - MO (94.76) **Personal record** and second time in the Top 10 of seven “Board Years” and eleventh highest scoring person of all time.
- 5 - 95-2X Ben Struzynski - WI (93.14) **Personal record** and second time in the Top 10 of two “Board Years” and thirteenth highest scoring person of all time.
- 6 - 93-3X Ryan Grohsmeyer - MO (90.30) Third time in the Top 10 of nine “Board Years”.
- 7 - 93 Mike Glenn - OH (89.12) Ninth time in the Top 10 of thirteen “Board Years” and is ranked #10 in the world in ISAC History.
- 8 - 93 Charles Swanson - TN (83.44) **Personal record** and **first time** in the Top 10 of thirteen “Board Years”.
- 9 - 92-3X Gary Fogelman - PA (90.54) **Sixteenth** time in the Top 10 of nineteen “Board Years” and still **ranked #1 in the world in ISAC History**.
- 10 - 92X Jordan Ashley - TN (84.05) Second time in the Top 10 of two “Board Years”

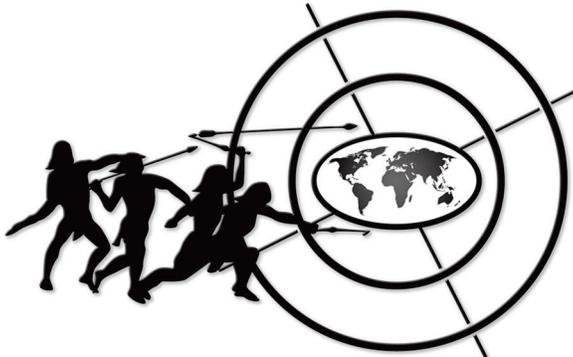
